By establishing and maintaining standards for these skills and how workers are trained and recognized, the CMSDS helps the Canadian mining industry stay aligned.

Canadian Mining Essential Skills Training

MiHR's training to employment programs teach the essential and work readiness (non-technical) skills which the mining industry has validated and deemed necessary for employment in the industry.

Canadian Mining Occupational Training

MiHR's occupational training programs teach the foundational and technical skills needed to be safe and effective in the mining industry in various occupations. Effective occupational training in the mining industry has three critical components:

- In-Class Foundational Training
- Hands On/Applied Practical Learning
- Work Experience/Placement to Practice Learnings

Canadian Mining Training Recognition Program

The Canadian Mining Training Recognition Program (CMTRP) recognizes mine training programs delivered by employers, educational institutions and training organizations that align to MiHR's National Occupational Training Standards (NOTS). It assesses a training programs' learning outcomes and objectives to recognize alignment with industry needs.

Canadian Mining Certification Program

Certification, through the Canadian Mining Certification Program, is a competency-based assessment of an individual's documentation of training and workplace experience in the mining industry against a specific National Occupational Standard (NOS).
